






Ephesus is the city where Paul visited, preached the gospel, and gained followers. The church of Ephesus which was the head of the seven churches was established by Paul.





Revelation.




Crete, Greece's largest island, is known for its varied terrain, which ranges from fine-sand beaches at Elafonisi to the White Mountains.

Philippi was an important city in eastern Macedon which flourished in the Hellenistic, Roman, and Byzantine Periods.



Meteora, meaning
"suspended in air", is an
area in central Greece
filled with large
monolithic pillars made
of sandstone. Twenty-four
of the monasteries were
completed in te 15th
century.



This is the location of the Battle of Thermopylae. The Greek forces, mostly Spartan, were led by Leonidas.



Corinth is an ancient city and former municipality in Corinth, Peloponnese, which is located in southcentral Greece.



The Acropolis of Athens is an ancient citadel located on a rocky outcrop above the city of Athens and contains the remains of several ancient buildings of great architectural and historic significance, the most famous being the Parthenon.




This bare marble hill is called Areopagus. It was later named Mars Hill after the Greek god of war. This is the location of Paul's Sermon on Mars Hill.





The Canal connects the Gulf of Corinth with the Saronic Gulf in the Aegean Sea. It slices through the Isthmus of Corinth and separates the Peloponnese from the Greek mainland, arguably making the peninsula an island.
